So why is Global Church Engagement important?

- The Great Commission was not a circumstantial mandate.
- To this day, there are still people groups who have yet to hear the Gospel for the first time; people groups with no Bible, no Believers and no Body of Christ.

“FTT specifically focuses on these last unengaged and unreached people groups, convening partners and gathering and pooling resources so that these final UUPGs might also be engaged and reached with the Gospel.”

- Global Church Engagement is important because even as we engage people groups with the Gospel, we are also engaging and equipping them to become part of the Great Commission workforce
- When the people of God pray, there can be unity and true innovative collaboration

FTT UUPG Engagement List

- Updated monthly at www.finishingthetask.com (under the “Peoples Group” tab)
- Goal is to get the engagement list to zero
- 218 UUPGs (approximately since July 2020)
- 47 of the UUPGs are Deaf People Groups (this may change with the discovery of more Deaf UUPGs)
- In December 2019, FTT established the Deaf Coalition to focus solely on the engagement and reaching of the Deaf People Groups around the world.
Less than 2% of all the Deaf people in the world know Jesus, making them the largest unreached people group on the planet.

- FTT is committed to Saturation Evangelism--every available means, to reach every available person, at every available time.
